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Afraid of the gym? Here are 3 sociallydistanced outdoor alternatives! www.euronews.com

Even if your local gym has re-opened its doors, you may not be all that keen to return just yet - and you aren't alone in feeling that way. A survey in the US shows that only 5% of people are happy to return to fitness facilities. Medical professionals support this wariness too. Dr James Voos, chairman of orthopaedic surgery at University Hospitals Cleveland Medical Center authored a study which considered just how contagious spaces like gyms are. "When you have a relatively high density of people exercising and sweating in a contained space, you have conditions where communicable diseases can spread easily," explains Dr Voos. So, what are the best outdoor alternatives? Here are three suggestions for you.



Paddle-boarding

Paddle-boarding isn't the most conventional form of exercise, but if you want to social distance and enjoy nature, there's nothing like paddleboarding. It's a great full body exercise, really putting your core to the test, without being a high impact workout like running or a fitness class. Sure, it's not the most accessible sport, but more and more beach areas rent out paddle-boards, and most basic boards are pretty stable and easy to get to grips with.



Cycling

Cycling is another low-impact sport, so it's somewhat easier on your joints, while still ensuring you get a proper workout. There are far fewer cars on the road right now, which makes riding safer and easier than usual. Plus, if you get into cycling now, you've developed a great new commuting method for the future. Though cycling is obviously a great way to experience nature and see the area around you, if the weather isn't great, or you aren't confident on the roads, consider setting yourself up with Zwift – a virtual training for running and cycling program that enables users to interact, train and compete online. So, you can spend your mornings cycling around Paris or New York's Central Park, without ever leaving your home.

Plogging

Plogging is effectively running or jogging while litter-picking at the same time. It's a Swedish craze, and a portmanteau of 'jogging' and the Swedish word for 'pluck' – where runners collect rubbish as they run. Simply put on a pair of gloves and pick up a bin bag and you're ready to go. It's a great way of keeping parks and beaches clean and getting some



exercise at the same time. There are several plogging communities around the world, particularly on social media, so if you fancy making some new friends, this is the sport for you.

Zoom meeting fails!

Zoom is proving to be the tech solution for the pandemic. But things don't always go according to plan as these stories clearly show.

The driver

A senior councillor who joined a virtual council meeting while driving a lorry has been blasted for putting himself and other road users in a 'dangerous situation'. Councillor David Brown – who held the tourism, arts and culture brief on Boston Borough Council –



appeared at the cabinet meeting on Wednesday, September 9 from the cab of his moving vehicle. His dangerous actions have been captured in a video which shows him driving while using a device to connect to the meeting and has sparked outrage. He is seen looking at the screen and adjusting it on several occasions as he drives and at one point even takes his hand off the wheel to wave at the device to show his attendance when he discovers his microphone is muted. He drove for at least 20 minutes before disappearing from sight – and then reappeared on the screen for the rest of the meeting after he seemingly parked up. He has since quit his job with the council and the matter is being investigated by Lincolnshire Police and the council.

The robbery

In another story, a schoolgirl was robbed during a Zoom lesson in Ecuador as horrified teacher and students watched helplessly. The attack on the girl, named as Maria Jose, took place while she was on the Zoom chat with 25 others including her teacher in the city of Ambato in Tungurahua, central Ecuador, on Friday. The thieves were apparently unaware that their threats against the student were being filmed, which allowed her classmates to alert authorities and the victim's family, and cops were able to detain four suspects after they fled the scene. During the robbery, one of the pupils says: 'Does anyone have the address or the number of her parents?' Another replies: 'I have her mother's number'. A third classmate then says 'call her straight away'. The image appears to freeze on the screen after one of the thieves closes down the laptop in order to steal it together with other valuables from the property.

The passion

And in a final story, a couple were caught having sex during a Rio de Janeiro council video conference. Rio de Janeiro city council were discussing guaranteeing food for students in municipal system. The meeting was chaired by a member of the Socialism and Liberty Party, Leonel Brizola, who continued the discussion despite the scenes being relayed through the video feed. It was a meeting for the Rio de Janeiro city council, which local newspaper Metropoles reported was about how to guarantee food for students in the municipal system during the pandemic. The footage shows how the Zoom participant in the middle row on the right-hand side of the screen 'left' the meeting and started having sex on the bed in the background. The meeting reportedly continued for another four hours without further interruption. The other councillors in the meeting reportedly noticed the scenes but decided to ignore it and continue to discuss the matter at hand. In a statement, Brizola said the episode was an 'involuntary indiscretion' and regretted that the actual topic of the meeting was not being highlighted in media reports.

How having an alter ego can empower you!

How do the world's top stars gather the courage and determination to stand on stage, despite the nerves and anxiety of giving a bad performance? For both Beyoncé and Adele, the secret has been the creation of an alter ego – a separate entity. According to the experts, thinking of yourself as a separate entity can reduce anxiety, while also kicking up some major benefits for your confidence and determination.

Beyoncé's alter ego was the assertive and empowered 'Sasha Fierce'. This apparently allowed her to perform with extra self-confidence. "Usually when I hear the chords,

when I put on my stilettos, like the moment right before when you're nervous... then Sasha Fierce appears, and my posture and the way I speak and everything is different," she told Oprah Winfrey in 2008. It was a strategy that she continued to use until 2010, when she felt she had matured enough to avoid the psychological crutch.

Inspired by an emotional meeting with Beyoncé, Adele followed suit, telling *Rolling Stone* magazine in 2011 about her creation of 'Sasha Carter'. The persona was a combination of Beyoncé's Sasha Fierce persona and the (real) country music star June Carter. Adele said the strategy helped her give her best to every performance during her breakout year.

Although the embodiment of a fictional persona may seem like a gimmick for pop stars, new research suggests there may be some real psychological benefits to the strategy.

Adopting an alter ego is an extreme form of 'self-distancing', which involves taking a step back from our immediate feelings to allow us to view a situation more dispassionately.

"Self-distancing gives us a little bit of extra space to think rationally about the situation," says Rachel White, assistant professor of psychology at Hamilton College in New York State. It allows us to rein in undesirable feelings like anxiety, increases our perseverance on challenging tasks, and boosts our self-control.

Why not try it for yourself? The best thing is to pick a different person for different types of goals: maybe a wise member of your family for a personal dilemma, or a work mentor for a professional problem, or you could simply invent your own alter ego. And then take it from there. Good luck!

Kelsey Frost, 27, stepped in to help fellow shopper Joe Bakowski when he ended up stuck at a checkout in Sainsbury's, in Oadby, Leicester at the weekend.

Kelsey spotted Joe patting each of his pockets in turn before realising he had left his wallet at home. After overhearing him explaining his situation to the cashier, she walked over and told him she would happily pay for his shopping, which came in at



well over £100. She later said it was 'the right thing to do' and said people need to come together amid the coronavirus pandemic.

Joe, who repaid the cash a short time later, was so touched by her random act of kindness that he was moved to share it with the world to express his gratitude. He said: 'Queuing outside in the sunshine, it was great to see the Sainsbury's team working away calmly and professionally, but sharing a laugh with the queuing customers, too. 'I was shopping for my parents and my uncle as well as for my own family, so ended up spending over an hour inside searching the shelves for unfamiliar products, only to find that - once I'd run everything through checkout - I'd left my wallet at home.

'A young lady who had just finished at the next checkout immediately offered to pay for me - well over £100 - despite not knowing me from Adam. 'Not only that, she then waited around, with her young child, while I ran my parents' and my uncle's shopping through, too, and paid for that as well. 'Thank you Sainsbury's staff for keeping calm and carrying on, but more than anything, thank you Kelsey F for showing how wonderful people can be when the chips are down.'

Currently furloughed from work, Kelsey, from Oadby, said she had been shopping with her daughter, fiveyear-old Bella, when she spotted Joe and realised he was in a pickle. She said: 'I was at the self-service checkout and he was just a short distance away. 'I could see him tapping his pockets and then I heard him say to the cashier that he didn't have his wallet with him. 'I just said to him that I would pay for his shopping. 'It just seemed like the right thing to do - I wasn't sure whether he'd have to go home for his wallet and come back to the supermarket and queue up all over again. Online Retailing

Online retailers have done well during the pandemic. While Amazon's sales growth has been impressive for the past decade, the company received a big boost from the quarantine as consumers could not go to stores to make purchases. On March 12, the beginning of the COVID-19 lockdown, the company's stock price closed at \$1,676.61. By the end of June, it was nearly \$1,000 higher.

Hand-sanitizing products

Chicago-based Terraboost Media is an advertising agency. It has built a network of more than 72,000 hand-sanitizing billboards that dispense a dose of sanitizer below its advertisers' messages to consumers entering major supermarket chains, grocery stores and pharmacies. During the pandemic, the number of hand-sanitizing kiosks in the US has grown to 90,000 nationwide and is expected to approach 150,000 kiosks by the end of the year. Terraboost has had to dramatically increase its production to keep up with demand from its existing customers and others that are looking for hand-sanitizing solutions.

Entertainment

Netflix, added nearly 16 million new subscribers during the first quarter of 2020, and its growth numbers more than doubled what the company predicted. Quarter 1 2020, was the largest three-month jump in the streaming service's 13-year history, as people looked for entertainment options while theatres, cinemas, nightclubs and concert venues closed. Netflix boss Reed Hastings says coronavirus was 'a lucky break' for his company. Hastings co-founded Netflix in the nineties, and to begin with it was a DVD mail-order firm. Now, it has nearly 193 million paying members in 190 countries.

Britain may now technically find itself in a recession but households have still splashed the cash during lockdown. Purchases include a wide range of objects, from garden features such as pizza ovens to products to entertain the family and annoy the neighbours such as karaoke machines.

While the shutters came down on shops in mid-March and Britons were forced to stay indoors unless under certain circumstances, many households took to online shopping to spend money instead. Some of the buys were practical with e-retailers seeing a large increase in active wear and grooming kits while others were much more unusual. Not only did eBay see a rise in people shopping for Beatles' branded clothing, Argos saw a surge in customers purchasing Play-Doh with it being the number-one toy sold between March and April.

Those lucky enough to have gardens made the most of it during lockdown as temperatures soared to record levels. Hot tubs were widely considered the hottest commodity of lockdown with Argos reporting a sales increase of 242 percent year on year in March to April 2020. *Love the Sales*, an online site that tracks sales from over 1,000 online retailers operating in the UK, added that hot tub sales







increased by a massive 646 percent on its site between March to June 2020, when compared to the same time last year.

It said garden furniture sets and outdoor pizza oven sales were also both up by 306 percent while hedge trimmers saw an 82 percent increase year on year. Fire pits were also a popular choice for customers with e-commerce site, Etsy, reporting a 232 percent increase in searches for the garden feature in the last three months compared to the same time the previous year.

Dayna Isom Johnson, Etsy trend expert, said: 'With shoppers spending more time at home than ever, they are turning their attention to their gardens. Fire pits are becoming increasingly popular this summer giving people a reason to stay outside after dark keeping you warm and cosy.' Unable to go to festivals as planned, consumers took to taking the party to their back garden as searches for camping chairs were up 47 percent compared to 2019, and projectors were up by 126 percent on eBay as Britons streamed the best of Glastonbury from their gardens. Patio heaters also increased by 201 percent on Argos while sales of kids' ball games increased by 360 percent, paddling pools by 192 percent and water guns by 273 percent.

A large number of people planned to get fit during lockdown with active wear and fitness gear seeing huge leaps in interest this year as Britons decided to make the most of their allocated hour of exercise. Sales of fitness equipment increased by 132 percent at Argos during March and April this year, compared to last, with the Opti Basic exercise mat named as the number one selling fitness product.

Social media revenge as pizza delivery guy is 'belittled' at car business

The situation began Saturday, when Palace Pizza delivery guy Jarrid Tansey delivered \$42 worth of pizzas and drinks to a Westport car dealership. He was paid \$50 in two \$20s and two \$5s, said Palace Pizza manager Adam Willoughby.

When he returned from the delivery, someone from the car dealership called Willoughby, asking for the driver to return with change – roughly \$7 and some coins.



The video begins when Tansey returns to the dealership with the money. Upon handing over the change to a man seated behind a desk, Tansey can be heard saying, "It just doesn't make sense why you'd hand me a bill that you were just gonna have me drive back here to give you back anyway."

The man says to Tansey, "I gave you everything they gave me so we would get the correct change." The two go back and forth a few more times, neither giving up his position. "I'm not mad, I just had to waste my resources coming back here," Tansey says as he starts to leave. The man says to Tansey, "The manager apologized once for you, do you want him to apologize again for you?"" To which Tansey responds, "You got your \$7 back, so the world is right now."

One female employee follows Tansey out of the office, saying to him, "Get out the door before I put my foot in your ass," which prompts her co-workers to erupt in laughter. That woman's employment has since been terminated, according to Batista's statement. One of those involved was not an employee, he said. The video ends after another man, also using expletives, instructs his colleague to get Tansey's "owner and manager" on the phone. "I want him fired," he says.

Amanda Rogers, a former waitress, was so moved after seeing Tansey's video on LiveLeak, she called the pizza shop to find out the driver's name so she could send him a check. "For them to call him back over money he should've (should have) received anyway," Rogers said, "I decided to take it one step further." "Why not get the kid more than he deserves?" she said.

Rogers set up the fundraising page for Tansey. It's entitled "Get Jarrid his tip money!" Many left donations in \$7 increments, the amount Tansey drove back to return to the dealership. One commenter wrote, "You are a good example of someone treating people the way you want to be treated." A trip through the woods will also increase your body's adiponectin levels. These have an anti-inflammatory effect on blood vessel cells and have been shown to decrease the risk of heart attack.

3. More Energy and Better Sleep

Many of us notice the revitalized feeling we get from taking a deep breath in a natural location. It's not just your imagination – forest bathing has been shown to increase vigour and fight fatigue. At the same time, it triggers hormones and processes in our body that improve sleep. It's also been shown to reduce dopamine and cortisol levels, meaning it reduces stress and calms the body and mind.

4. Mood-Boosting Effects

A small study of 19 men showed that anxiety, depression and confusion levels were improved after a forest bathing trip. They compared the forest walking group to one walking through an urban area. Even though both groups had the health benefits of exercise, the forest bathing group clearly won out. This is just one example of the many studies showing the mood boosting effects of forest bathing.

5. Decreased Inflammation

Forest air is noticeably fresher than city air, or even other nature environments, since the trees are busy converting CO2 into fresh oxygen for our lungs. Not only is the air fresher, but the compounds naturally released by the trees decrease inflammation. The D-limonene found in some forest air reduces lung inflammation. Those with breathing problems like asthma have shown improvement after forest bathing as oxygen is increased and inflammation is lessened.

Coronavirus: Spanish regions ban smoking over Covid-19 risk

The Spanish region of Galicia has effectively banned smoking in public places over concerns it increases the risk of Covid-19 transmission. It issued a blanket ban on smoking in the street and in public places, such as restaurants and bars, if social distancing is not possible. The north-western region is the first to introduce such a measure, but the Canary Islands followed suit shortly after.

The move is supported by health ministry research, published recently, that outlined the link between smoking and the increased spread of coronavirus. It said the risk was heightened because people project droplets - and potentially Covid-19 - when they exhale smoke. It



also said smokers risked infection in other ways, such as by touching their cigarette before bringing it to their mouth and by handling face masks when taking them on and off.

The research also pointed to the wider negative health effects of smoking. "It has been proven that tobacco use, in any of its forms, worsens the course of respiratory diseases," it said. "Current evidence indicates that smoking is associated with a higher risk of developing a severe form of symptoms," it added. "Smoking with no limits... with people close by and without any social distancing poses a high risk of infection," regional President Alberto Núñez Feijóo told the news conference. "We know that this is an unpopular measure for smokers," added Alberto Fernández Villar, a member of the clinical committee advising government, according to the El País newspaper. "But I believe we are in an exceptional situation."

On Thursday, the Canary Islands announced a similar measure and banned smoking outdoors where social distancing cannot be **guaranteed**. It came into force on Friday alongside another order that makes face masks mandatory in public spaces. Officials in areas including Madrid, Andalusia and Valencia also implemented smoking restrictions of their own. Similar measures have been imposed elsewhere, such as in South Africa where the sale of tobacco was banned at the end of March. It justified the ban on health grounds **based** on advice from its own medical experts as well as from the World Health Organization (WHO).

And in the UK, a survey showed that more than one million people had given up smoking since the Covid-19 pandemic hit. UK government advice says smokers may be at risk of more severe Covid-19 symptoms. Doctors say smokers are more likely to get re**spir**atory infections and are more likely to develop complications such as pneumonia at a later stage.

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Turkey turns iconic Istanbul museum into mosque

The world-famous Hagia Sophia museum in Istanbul – originally founded as a cathedral – has been turned back into a mosque. Turkey's President Erdogan announced the decision after a court annulled the site's museum status.

Built 1,500 years ago as an Orthodox Christian cathedral, Hagia Sophia was converted into a mosque after the Ottoman conquest in 1453. In 1934 it became a museum and is now a UNESCO World Heritage site. Islamists in Turkey long called for it to be converted to a mosque, but secular opposition members opposed the move.



Defending the decision, President Erdogan stressed that the country had exercised its sovereign right in converting it back to a mosque. "Like all our mosques, the doors of Hagia Sophia will be wide open to locals and foreigners, Muslims and non-Muslims," he added. Turkish officials also say Christian emblems, including mosaics of the Virgin Mary on the golden dome, will not be removed.

Making changes at Hagia Sophia is profoundly symbolic. Kemal Ataturk, the founder of modern Turkey, decreed that it should be a museum. President Erdogan is now taking one more step to dismantle Ataturk's secular legacy, and remould Turkey according to his vision. The Turkish leader – who presents himself as a modern-day conqueror – says anyone who doesn't like it is attacking Turkey's sovereignty.

UNESCO has said it "deeply regrets" the decision to turn the museum into a mosque and called on the Turkish authorities to "open a dialogue without delay." The organisation had urged Turkey not to change its status without discussion.

Doctors to prescribe cycling and country walks in new obesity strategy!

Prime Minister Boris Johnson has set out his strategy to tackle obesity on Monday, including a 12-week plan for people to lose weight and GPs prescribing cycling. It comes after Public Health England research found that being overweight or obese puts people at greater risk of serious illness or death from Covid-19.

Ministers estimate that about two-thirds of adults in the UK are above a healthy weight. Mr Johnson has admitted that his



own weight was a factor in how badly he suffered from coronavirus. The government estimates that overweight and obesity related conditions are costing the NHS more than £6bn each year.

There were nearly 900,000 obesity related hospital admissions in 2018/19, with obesity a risk factor for chronic diseases including type 2 diabetes, some cancers, liver and respiratory disease. The "Better Health" campaign will aim to reach 35 million people in a bid "to help them lose weight and live healthier lives", the government said. This will be supported by a 12-week plan that people can use to develop healthier eating habits, get more active and lose weight.

In a similar move, doctors are being told to prescribe country walks to boost patients' physical and mental health under new proposals to ease burden on NHS. In a recent speech, Environment Secretary George Eustice said that instead of simply handing out pills, GPs and other health professionals should start issuing 'green prescriptions' telling patients to visit Britain's beauty spots. Under the £4million scheme, doctors will also be able to urge people to do gardening, join cycling and walking groups, take part in outdoor 'green gym' sessions and even help plant trees in their local area.

The plan could also be used to send vulnerable people – such as care home residents – on coach trips to Britain's national parks and areas of outstanding natural beauty. It is hoped that the scheme will boost the country's mental health, help tackle the obesity problem and also help coronavirus sufferers to recover.

Transport for London REMOVES Banksy's sneezing rats artwork

Graffiti artist Banksy's latest work inside a London Underground train carriage has been removed by Transport for London (TfL).

The guerrilla artist, dressed in a high-vis jacket, boiler suit, goggles and face mask, painted a black rat coughing and sneezing green paint across the carriage's window and walls to encourage people to cover their faces in public.

The piece, named 'If you don't mask - you don't get', is encouraging Britons to wear masks to halt the spread of Covid-19

Using the same pressure sprayer used by London Underground staff to disinfect trains, Banksy also tagged the door leading to the driver's cab. He later painted other rats using face masks as parachutes or shooting antibacterial hand gel.





TfL confirmed on Tuesday evening that the work was

removed due to a strict anti-graffiti policy, but that it would welcome Banksy to recreate his message 'in a suitable location'. A TfL spokesperson said: 'We appreciate the sentiment of encouraging people to wear face coverings, which the vast majority of customers on our transport network are doing.'

A British Transport Police spokesperson said: 'Banksy's strength of feeling towards the importance of wearing face coverings on public transport mirrors our own. This is why we have hundreds of officers out across the capital every day encouraging passengers to wear their face coverings. 'Regardless, please remember that it is an offence to deface any Tube or train carriage, or other station property.'

Fans have hailed his work, calling it 'powerful' and 'crucial'. However, critics were shocked that he was able to graffiti a train while posing as a Tube worker before walking off and out of the station minutes later. It also appears he was able to graffiti a wall on a platform with nobody noticing.

#BloggerGate – publicity for a free stay at a hotel!

A British YouTube vlogger has accused a Dublin hotel of bullying her after it refused her request to stay there for free.

Elle Darby, 22, of Bath, Somerset, wrote to Paul Stenson, the owner of the White Moose Café in Dublin. She asked about a "possible collaboration" involving free accommodation for her and her partner, who were planning to visit for an early Valentine's Day weekend.

'I would love to feature you in my Youtube videos, dedicated Instagram stories and posts to bring traffic to your hotel and recommend others to book up in return for free accommodation,' she wrote.

But her note was greeted with disdain by Mr Stenson. He not only poured scorn on the request but he also posted the exchange online - and has now banned bloggers from his hotel. In Mr Stenson's reply, he told her she lacked 'self-respect and dignity.'

'It takes a lot of balls to send an email like that. If I let you stay here in return for a feature in your video, who is going to pay the staff who look after you?

Who is going to pay waiters who serve you breakfast? The receptionist who checks you in? Who is going to pay for the light and heat you use during your stay? The laundering of your bed sheets? The water rates? 'Maybe I should tell my staff they will be featured in your video instead of receiving payment for work carried out while you're in residence?'

The Facebook post was greeted with mixed reactions, with some accusing Mr Stenson of bullying. Others accused Ms Darby of being a 'spoiled brat'. Ms Darby claimed Mr Stenson's actions had led to her being targeted by online trolls. 'As a 22-year-old girl, who's running her own business from her home, I don't feel like I did anything wrong,' she said. She added: 'These were all 30 years plus people bullying a 22-year-old girl who is just trying to run her own business and raise awareness of what appeared to be a stunning Dublin hotel.'

In a more recent development, Paul Stenson sent the blogger an INVOICE for €5,289,000 'for all the publicity it's given her'.

A 1911 oil painting of Ivan the Terrible that was believed to have been destroyed during World War II is to be returned to Ukraine after it was found hanging in a Connecticut house.

"Secret Departure of Ivan the Terrible Before the Oprichnina" by Mikhail N. Panin and depicting the famous 16thcentury Russian czar went missing from an art museum in Ukraine during World War II.

But it was revealed to have hung for



decades in a house in Connecticut, US, where it was passed from seller to seller. They were unaware of its history because it was considered too large to move.

It was discovered in 2017 when homeowners Gabby and David Tracy called a Virginia auction house to sell their art collection because they were downsizing and included the century-old painting in the lot.

Anne Craner, The Potomack Company's European paintings specialist, researched its origins to determine its value and confirmed that it was indeed Mikhail N. Panin's work. Curators of the art museum had included it in a list of works "taken to Germany during the war.

She contacted the FBI's division dedicated to recovering stolen artwork which launched an official procedure. The Ukrainian embassy provided evidence to the court and the painting was handed over to the embassy ahead of its return trip to the eastern European country.

The US embassy in Kiev, the Ukrainian capital, congratulated US and Ukrainian law enforcement agencies for their joint efforts to repatriate the painting. "The FBI is proud to work with our partners to mark this important art repatriation and return the painting to the Ukrainian Embassy. The FBI works to return stolen art and other property to preserve the history and culture of countries around the world," said Timothy M. Dunham, special agent in charge of the Washington Field Office's Criminal Division.

Cosmetic surgeons see rise in patients amid pandemic

A number of cosmetic surgery clinics around the world are reporting a rise in people getting treatment during the coronavirus outbreak as they can hide their treatment behind a mask or work from home.

Despite the virus shutting businesses across the globe, a number of plastic surgery clinics have remained open, adopting stricter measures such as Covid-19 tests and more frequent cleaning.



Clinics in the US, Japan, South Korea and Australia have all seen a rise in patients coming in for treatment including lip fillers, botox, face lifts and nose jobs. Bo tox buttocks nalgas

"I decided to get procedures done during quarantine because it allowed me to heal at my own pace," Aaron Hernandez, who had lip fillers and buccal (cheek) fat removal in Los Angeles, told the BBC.

"Getting your lips done is not something that all men tend to do, so some people might find it a bit strange. So, I wanted to stay home and recover fully without people knowing what work I had done."

The last time he had the procedure done before quarantine, he said, he had to go out in public for work and his lips were "extremely swollen and bruised".

Rod J Rohrich, a cosmetic surgeon based in Texas, said he was seeing a lot more patients. "Even more than I would say is normal. We could probably operate six days a week if we wanted to. It's pretty amazing," he told the BBC.

He said usually people would have to factor in recovery at home when considering surgery. However, now that many people are working from home, this doesn't need to be considered.

"They can actually recover at home. Also, they can have a mask that they wear when they go outside after a facelift. People want to resume their normal lives and part of that is looking as good as they feel."

How to stay alive as a doctor!

A doctor has revealed exactly what she eats in a day to promote healthy ageing, as well as her food rules for good health. Dr Kate Gregorevic, from Melbourne, said she is 'very conscious' that what she eats has a big impact on how her body functions now and in the future. So, she tries to include as many plant-based foods and wholefoods as possible.

'While I do enjoy a little meat or fish for vitamin B12 and iron, vegetables and wholegrains (like oats or brown rice) make up the bulk of my diet,' Dr Gregorevic told the Sydney Morning Herald.

Dr Gregorevic said that alongside eating mainly plants, another of her food rules is to avoid ultra-processed foods like biscuits, cakes and many popular breakfast cereals. Here's a typical day for the doctor:

- * 5.30am: Large flat white upon waking.
- * 6:30am: Porridge with oats, chia seeds, pear, raw cacao and pine nuts.
- * 10am: Coffee with two pieces of 90% cocoa chocolate.

* 12.30pm: Leftover mushroom and brown rice risotto with some kale and half an avocado. An apple with peanut butter.

* 4pm: A handful of raw nuts.

* 5.30pm: Roast chicken with lentils, leeks and peas.

'I never have soft drinks or fruit juice as they're full of empty kilojoules, and they have no effect on satiety and its consumption is so strongly linked with obesity that some countries have introduced a tax on drinks with added sugar,' Dr Gregorevic said.

'There is some evidence that giving ourselves a break for a few hours from eating is another strategy for cellular repair. So, I give myself a 12-hour eating break in a day, which just means not eating again until breakfast after an early dinner,' she explained.

What are Dr Gregorevic's seven tips to age well?

* Eat more protein as you get older. To maintain or build muscle, older adults actually have a higher protein requirement than younger adults, of approximately 1.2g/kg.

* Eat plenty of healthy fats each day, particularly omega-3, as these can decrease the risk of heart attack and stroke.

* Eat the rainbow and as varied a diet as possible, and try to avoid eating the same foods each day as different foods have different micronutrients.

- * Eat plenty of fibre to help create more feelings of fullness.
- * Eat a diet of mainly plant-based foods, but incorporate a little meat in order to get vitamin B12 and iron.
- * Avoid ultra-processed foods.
- * Give your digestive system a break between eating ideally up to 12 hours.

FYRE: The Greatest Party That Never Happened

Fyre Festival was the most talked about festival experience of 2017, but not because anyone had any fun there. Advertised by famous faces including model

Bella Hadid, it was billed as a glamorous party on a deserted island. Tickets cost up to \$100,000 and guests who booked were promised luxury accommodation and "the best in food, art, music and adventure" in the Bahamas.

Instead they turned up to mattresses on rain-soaked floors, meals of cheese slices on bread and their luggage thrown into an unlit car park. Fyre Festival is now the subject of two docu**men**taries, one of which premiered on Netflix. Seth Crossno, a blogger and podcaster, and his three friends spent \$45,000 on tickets, travel and luxury accommodation. But when they turned up, they found it was still practically a building site. "There were still workers, pick-up trucks and 18wheelers everywhere," he told Radio 1 Newsbeat.

The Netflix documentary, *Fyre: The Greatest Party That Never Happened*, focuses on the disastrous build-up to the event – which was organised by businessman Billy McFarland on the Caribbean island of Great Exuma, in the Bahamas. "The organisers had six to eight weeks to pull off something that

should have taken close to a year," says Chris Smith, who directed the documentary. "But what was most surprising to me was going to the Bahamas and seeing the aftermath of what was left behind and the effect on the people there."

Fyre Festival wasn't just a miserable experience for the people who paid to party, it also had a major impact on the local people of the island who helped organisers build the festival. "They had engaged with so much of the local community to try and pull this off. There were hundreds of day labourers working," says Chris. One restaurant owner in the documentary admits she used up over \$50,000 providing the catering for Fyre Festival staff in the build up to the event. "She put in a huge part of her savings," says Chris. "But in the end, when things fell apart everyone just left, and no one paid her a dime."

Following Fyre's collapse, con artist Billy was convicted of fraud and jailed for six years. Rapper Ja Rule was originally described as a co-organiser of the event - but was not arrested or charged in connection with the fraud. His lawyers have argued that McFarland used his name and connections to promote the event. "Six years doesn't seem to fit with what he did and the impact he had on everyone else," says Seth.

US conspiracy theorists attack masks

Anti-mask sentiment is running high in the US. There have been several examples.

On May 1, an argument broke out at a grocery shop in Manhattan's Chinatown between the owner and two customers. Eventually, police were called, and all parties were arrested. The owner of the store had asked the customers to wear masks in line with the city's recommendation. The stubborn customers declined.



At another shop in Illinois, a customer who didn't want to wear a mask threatened to shoot a staff member. And at various protests around the country, those opposed to the lockdowns have carried rifles and handguns, but not masks. In Oklahoma City, a requirement for wearing masks in public survived only for a few hours before the mandatory measure was turned into a "recommendation" after public resistance.

This bizarre anti-mask movement is being encouraged from the top. President Donald Trump and Vice President Mike Pence have stood side by side with cabinet officials at daily briefings throughout the crisis without masks. Trump visited a mask manufacturing factory recently, and Pence a hospital – neither wearing masks in places where they should have had one.

Some Trump supporters have interpreted this as a signal that no one should be forced to wear a mask. They feel these rules infringe on their civil liberties. There are also boycotts against possible mandatory vaccines; and many conspiracy theorists claim that the whole **pandemic** is a plot to turn humanity into robots – using vaccines of course.

At a public meeting in Palm Beach, Florida, anti-mask members of the public verbally attacked officials. One told the commissioners that they would be "punished by God" if they voted to make it obligatory to wear face masks in public. Another referred to the county commissioners as "communist dictators" who follow "the devil's laws". Many felt that the measure would violate the Constitution and threaten freedom by imposing the measure. One speaker threatened to perform a citizen's arrest on the officials for going "against her freedom of choice."

The 5G Coronavirus Conspiracy Theory Has Taken a Dark Turn

Mobile phone masts in the UK are being attacked by arsonists on a daily basis. This is because of a conspiracy theory linking 5G to the spread of coronavirus.

New data seen by WIRED UK reveals that dozens of attacks have taken place. Con**spir**acy theorists



target both infrastructure and key workers in the belief that they are somehow spreading coronavirus. In one incident, a broadband engineer was spat at in the face by an enraged member of the public. The engineer is now ill with suspected coronavirus.

Since 30th March, there have been 77 arson attacks on mobile phone masts across the UK. Staff working on mobile **in**frastructure have also reported 180 incidents of abuse. There have been 13 additional incidents of sabotage reported. These range from failed arson attacks, **to** attempts to damage mobile network **in**frastructure.

The con**spir**acy theory linking 5G to coronavirus has spread rapidly through Facebook and YouTube. Britain's airline travellers have been given instructions to minimise the risks of spreading coronavirus – and urged to take cabin baggage.

The Department for Transport (DfT) recommends passengers check in all baggage, saying: "This will speed

boarding and disembarking and minimise the risk of transmission." The intention is to reduce the amount of standing and waiting in the airport.

The smallest 15kg checked-in bag on easyJet for the first domestic flight, from Gatwick to Glasgow, costs £25.49. The new DfT rules say passengers should check-in online to avoid face-to-face contact at the airport.

The guidance also says: "Wash your hands for at least 20 seconds after using self-service check-in, luggage trolleys and other frequently touched surfaces." Travellers should not be seen off or met at airports, unless they need assistance.

On board the aircraft, the DfT says passengers should:

- Remain seated as much as possible
- Follow instructions and guidance from crew
- Use contactless payment where possible
- Be aware there is likely to be a reduced food and drink service
- Make the cabin crew aware if you become ill

On arrival, passengers are told: "Leave the airport as quickly as possible."

The transport secretary, Grant Shapps, said: "We are taking the necessary steps to ensure a framework is in place for the aviation industry to bounce back when it is safe for restrictions on travel to be lifted."

Getting plenty of exercise prevents 26,600 early deaths in the UK every year – and almost four million around the world, a study shows.

Researchers at Cambridge and Edinburgh universities calculated the figures after deciding that too much focus is given to the negative health consequences of modern sedentary lifestyles. Instead of repeatedly telling people they will die if they sit on the sofa, health leaders should celebrate the benefits of getting active, they say.



Health experts often frame the debate in terms of the number of early deaths due to lack of physical activity – estimating that 3.2 million die prematurely each year.

Now there is a growing emphasis on health leaders to praise exercise benefits, rather than simply issuing warnings regarding the detriment effects of not getting out and about.

Dr Tessa Strain, of the Cambridge MRC Epidemiology Unit, said: 'We're used to looking at the downsides of not getting enough activity – whether that's sports or a gym or just a brisk walk at lunchtime. But by focusing on the number of lives saved, we can tell a good news story of what is already being achieved.' She added: 'We hope our findings will encourage governments and local authorities to protect and maintain services in challenging economic climates.'

Swiss police are looking for a forgetful individual who left something rather important on a train: a package full of gold bars, worth more than \$190,000.

The parcel containing the gold bars was found in the carriage of a Swiss Federal Railways (SBB) train travelling from the north-eastern Swiss town of St Gallen to Lucerne, a city in the centre of the country.

Despite "extensive investigations," the owner of the package had not been tracked down, officials said.



After authorities failed to track down the owner of the precious cargo, the gold bars were confiscated by the public prosecutor's office.

Now, authorities have decided to publicise their attempt to find the mysterious owner. In a bulletin dated June 2, officials said the owner has five years to make a claim for the treasure. A spokesperson for the prosecutor's office said that several inquiries had been made about the gold and were being checked.

Ministers consider NHS contact-tracing app rethink

The UK's contact-tracing app has run into a number of difficulties involving privacy issues and the effectiveness of Bluetooth.



Contact-tracing apps are designed to prevent a second wave of infections by keeping a log of when two people are in close proximity to each other and for how long.

If one of the users later tests positive for the disease, the records are used to determine how likely it is they have infected the other person. If required, an alert is triggered to help prevent the further spread of the virus. People who are alerted have to go into quarantine for 14 days.

The UK has adopted what is known as a "centralised" approach, meaning that the contact-matching process is carried out on a remote computer server. One benefit is it offers epidemiologists more data. France and India are other countries to have adopted this model.

By contrast, Apple and Google's "decentralised" approach carries out the matches on the handsets themselves. They say this better protects users' privacy. Switzerland, Ireland, Germany, Italy and Latvia are among others to have adopted the tech giants' design.

Health Secretary Matt Hancock had originally said the NHS Covid-19 app was to be launched across England - and possibly other parts of the UK - by 1 June. But he subsequently said the government had decided it would be better to establish a network of human contact tracers first.

However, the BBC has discovered that one of the main reasons the initiative is running behind schedule is that developers are having problems using Bluetooth as a means to estimate distance. Signal strength "can vary substantially" depending on:

- ... how deeply a handset is placed in a bag
- ... whether the signal has to pass through a human body to reach the other phone
- ... if the two people are walking side-by-side or one behind the other
- ... if the devices are indoors rather than outdoors
- ... whether the smartphone is surrounded by metal objects

'Princess Diana's favourite' restaurant will not reopen after lockdown

The exclusive restaurant Le Caprice in central London was popular with several A-list stars, including Princess Diana, Elton John and Hollywood star Tom Cruise. However, the restaurant will not be reopening after the coronavirus lockdown is lifted.

Le Caprice is now permanently closed after 38 years in its current location. It is one of several exclusive London restaurants that will not be reopening post-lockdown. The restaurant was initially opened in 1947 by Mario Gallati, a former maitre d' at The Ivy, who ran it until 1975.

In 1981, Chris Corbin and Jeremy King took over the restaurant and restored it to its former glory. It went onto become a haven for the stars, including Mick Jagger and Elizabeth Taylor, as well as royals like Princess Margaret and Princess Alexandra. It was later bought by its current owner, businessman Richard Caring.



Just recently, Caring launched a blistering attack on the government recently. He warned that Boris Johnson's 'weakness and indecision' on reopening restaurants, pubs and cafes will cost more than two million workers their jobs. Caring also said that the Prime Minister was 'killing the country' by failing to outline when hospitality venues could reopen and whether they would have to abide by the two-metre social distancing rule.

He told The Mail on Sunday that thousands of businesses and their employees were surviving thanks only to the Government's taxpayer-funded furlough scheme that pays staff wages, and a pause on rent and business rates tax bills.

However, as soon as state aid measures are withdrawn, Caring warned, as many as '50 or 60% of the fourmillion-strong hospitality workforce could be laid off; and restaurants, cafes and bars shuttered for good. He said the wave of redundancies would be 'like a volcano' erupting, with the worst of the pain coming when the furlough scheme ends.

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Edward Colston: Bristol slave trader statue thrown into river

A statue of a slave trader was torn down during an anti-racism Black Lives Matter protest in Bristol

Mayor Marvin Rees said he felt no "sense of loss" after the controversial bronze statue of Edward Colston was pulled down and thrown into the harbour protesters on Sunday.

But Prime Minister Boris Johnson described it as a "criminal act". Local police said a decision was taken to intervene.

Mr Johnson's official spokesman said: "The PM's view is that in this country, where there is strong opinion, there is a democratic process which should followed.

"People can campaign for the removal of a statue but what happened yesterday was a criminal act and when the criminal law is broken that is unacceptable and the police will want to hold to account those responsible.

Edward Colston (2nd November 1636 – 11th October 1721) was an English merchant, slave trader, Tory Member of Parliament, and philanthropist. Born in Bristol to a family of merchants that had lived in the city since the 1340s, he became a merchant, initially trading in wine, fruits and cloth, mainly in Spain, Portugal and other European ports.

In 1680, he became heavily involved in the slave trade through his membership of the Royal African Company, which held a monopoly of the British trade in African slaves. He became Deputy Governor, the highest office of the company, in 1689. It is uncertain exactly how much of his wealth stemmed from the slave trade. Colston used his wealth to support schools, hospitals, almshouses and churches in Bristol, London and elsewhere. His name is commemorated by several Bristol landmarks, streets and schools.

With everyone except key workers being asked to stay at home from late March, convenience food group Greencore suddenly saw a vast drop in customer numbers.

Supplying own-brand sandwiches to all the major supermarkets, and staff canteens - overnight there was hardly anybody in the UK's offices and other workplaces, to pop out in their lunchbreak and buy a BLT or egg mayo.



As a result, Greencore says its main "food-to-go" division, which usually sells 700 million sandwiches per year, plus salads and sushi, saw sales slump by 70% over the following month and a half.

Patrick, who has led the Dublin-based and London-listed company since 2008 says it has been a "period of unprecedented uncertainty". And in an interview with Irish broadcaster RTE, he said it made previous worries about Brexit "seem very trivial.

In response to coronavirus, Greencore has shut three of its 16 UK facilities and furloughed 4,000 of its 11,500 employees. Patrick and his fellow board members have cut their own pay by 30%.

He says he is proud of the staff that have remained in work, making sandwiches that include the "thousands" given for free to NHS workers across 20 UK hospitals.

"Our people have been working around the clock to ensure that we can continue to provide high quality, fresh prepared food to both consumers and frontline workers during the pandemic."



Of the 20,000 motorists polled for the AA (the Automobile Association – a driver insurance company), half said they would walk more and 40% intended to drive less.

Austrian president 'sorry' for breaking lockdown rules

Austria's President Alexander Van der Bellen has apologised after staying at a restaurant beyond the coronavirus-related closing time of 23:00. He remained at the restaurant in the capital, Vienna, until after midnight.

Mr Van der Bellen, 76, said he had lost track of the time while speaking with friends at the Italian restaurant in the



centre of the city. Austria was one of the first countries in Europe to follow Italy in imposing a strict lockdown.

It was also one of the first to begin easing its restrictions. Gatherings of up to 10 people have been allowed since the start of May, and public parks, small shops, DIY stores and garden centres have been open since last month.

"I'm sincerely sorry. It was a mistake," Mr Van der Bellen said. "I went out for the first time since the lockdown with two friends and my wife," he wrote on Twitter. "We then lost track of the time while chatting."

The president was spotted by police on the outside dining area of the restaurant shortly after midnight on Sunday, local media report. But the government's latest rules say restaurants and cafés, which were allowed to reopen last week, must close no later than 23:00.

The restaurant could be fined for a breach, but Mr Van der Bellen said he would "take responsibility" if the owner suffers any losses as result of the incident. "We closed after a last round of drinks on time at 23:00, as required by law," the owner told the Krone newspaper. He said he had thought that customers were allowed to stay on the terrace beyond that time if they wished.
